California Legislators Urge Congress to Pass Strong Violence Against Women Act

Sacramento, February 11, 2013 —Today legislators in the California Senate and Assembly passed three resolutions urging federal lawmakers to pass a strong, bipartisan Violence Against Women Act (VAWA), recognizing the importance of VAWA as the cornerstone of the federal response to domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence and stalking. The popular and formerly bipartisan bill ran into trouble in the 2012 session, when House Republicans called for amendments to the Senate bill that limited protections for certain victim groups: immigrant, Native American and LGBT victims. VAWA passed the Senate but died in the House at the end of last session, and will be voted on again by the Senate this week.

The three California resolutions—Senate Resolution 8 (Yee); Senate Joint Resolution 2 (Jackson); and Assembly Joint Resolution 8 (Perez and Lowenthal), ask Congress to reauthorize VAWA in a way that protects all victims and ensures the sustainability of the essential programs VAWA funds. California Partnership to End Domestic Violence (the Partnership) executive director Tara Shabazz thanked the California Legislature on behalf of her agency's statewide membership.

“VAWA cannot be sacrificed to partisan fighting in DC” she said. “Our communities count on VAWA programs to reduce crime and support victims. The safety of families must come first.”

The Partnership and its member programs commend our legislators for taking a strong stand on VAWA, and advocating for victims and families across the state.
