#### Gender Based HAVEN Program

Based on our understanding of the diversity of the human experience, Catalyst provides shelter services to all victims of domestic violence who meet Catalyst's criteria for emergency shelter including people who identify as women, men or transgender.

Catalyst will provide emergency shelter services to individuals based on their self-identified gender. Women are sheltered in the communal housing facility that Catalyst administers. Men are sheltered in hotels or referred to other appropriate shelters. Transgender individuals will be assessed for a stay in one of the above mentioned shelter options or the option that feels the most comfortable for them. Assessment for shelter services will be determined by the self-identified gender of the participant, regardless of medical transition status.

#### Expanding Your Frame to Include LGBT\*Q+ Perspectives

Aydin Kennedy, MSWI A Melody Proebstel, MSW A Thomas Kelem, MFT

Aydin is a well known speaker and advocate for creating a Trans\* affirming practice and world. During this past year as an MSW Intern he has created the Stonewall Counseling Program which now provides low/no fee services to the LGBT\*Q+ community and has grown to include Licensed, Trainee, and Intern level counselors. Aydin speaks with honesty and humor to create a safe place for people to ask important questions to gain a better understanding of the trans\* experience. (May 24 he will graduate with his MSW)

Melody is program coordinator for the LGBT\*Q+ Program at Catalyst Domestic Violence Services. She will talk about abusive relationships in the LGBT\*Q+ community. Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) is experienced in 25-33% of our relationships, and it has rippling effects that impact all of us in different ways. We will explore: important distinctions to be aware of when assessing IPV in LGBT\*Q+ relationships; what it looks like; how you can help clients who are experiencing it; how supporting development of healthy relationships is the antidote to continuing the perpetuation of abuse; and what services Catalyst can provide to support you in your work.







# Regional Trainings - Individualized



Benefits of belonging to a privileged community...

- Safety
- Structure
- Sense of belonging
- Access to resources

What is the impact of isolation on victims of intimate partner violence who don't have the privilege of being involved in community? **Myth:** Women and gay men are less violent than heterosexual men. Therefore, they are not as capable of hurting their partner.

 Physical violence is the most frequent type of IPV reported in LGBTQ+ relationships

#### Suggestions for Aspiring Allies

### Sexual identity and transgender status are private information

- Don't share someone's gender/sexual identity with others without their expressed permission
  - "Do you feel safe sharing your identity with others?"
  - "Where are you out about your identity? At work? School? With new acquaintances?"
  - "What can I do to support you and help you to feel safe in this space?"



#### Shelter Residents

- Advocates are in position of power
- · Understand complexity of experience
- Monitor your own hidden bias

#### **Barriers to Accessing Services**

- Fear that the abuse will not be taken seriously because it is occurring within an LGBTQ relationship.
- Lack of acknowledgement and support from other LGBTQ individuals who may not be aware of the fact that DV in LGBTQ relationships occurs and is dangerous.
- Fear of re-victimization by law enforcement, criminal justice, and social service workers based on one's sexual orientation and/or gender identity.
- · Small communities, shared friends, shared public spaces

Heteronormativity is the assumption that:

- everyone is heterosexual
- heterosexual is the correct and superior way to be
